#### School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2017-18)

Grades 6-8 school that opened August 21, 2012

School is named after Barbara Chilton who began her teaching career with the Roseville City School District in 1965. Barbara taught regular and special education at Eich, Woodbridge, Crestmont and Cirby from 1965-1975. Beginning in 1975 Mrs. Chilton worked in the Student Services department at the District Office until she retired in 1989.

As of December 2017, the school serves 710 students

As of December 2017, Chilton has 31 teachers (4 part-time) and 25 support staff (some part-time)

Chilton State testing scores are some of the highest in Placer County. In 2012-13, Chilton students scored the highest API ever for any middle school in the Roseville City School District (918)! API stands for Academic Performance Index. In 2013-14, Chilton had the highest percentage of students scoring Advanced on the 2013-14 Science CST in all of Placer County. In the 2014-15 school year, Chilton had an amazing 97% of the 8th-grade students score proficient or advanced on the State CST Science test. In 2015-16 and 2016-17, Chilton had the highest percentage of students scoring meets or exceeds standard in Language Arts when compared to all other middle schools in Roseville. These results were based on data from the State CAASPP testing.

## **School Mission/Vision of Chilton:**

"The mission of Barbara Chilton Middle School is to inspire, enable, and empower all students to meet high academic and social standards that will prepare them for high school and beyond."

Vision- "With a strong collaborative partnership between parents and school, Chilton staff will: 1) Develop strong relationships with students by knowing their passions, strengths, and challenges. 2) Teach students to solve complex and meaningful problems. 3) Develop 21st-century skills 4) incorporate leadership habits to build student independence and positive peer relationships. 5) Foster an environment in which students and staff are safe, responsible and respectful.

This school has 33 classrooms, a multipurpose room, a 10,000 sq. foot gymnasium, a performing arts building, large kitchen, library, a computer lab (second computer lab is in "EX" classroom) and an administration building.

Roseville City Elementary held a public hearing on September 7, 2017 and determined that each school within the district had sufficient and good quality textbooks, instructional materials, or science lab equipment pursuant to the settlement of Williams vs. the State of California. All students, including English learners, are given their own individual standards- aligned textbooks or instructional materials, or both, in core subjects for use in the classroom and to take home. Textbooks and supplementary materials are adopted according to a cycle developed by the California Department of Education, making the textbooks used in the school the most current available. Materials approved for use by the State are reviewed by all teachers and a recommendation is made to the School Board by a selection committee composed of teachers and administrators. All recommended materials are available for parent examination at the district office prior to adoption.

#### General

The District takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. To assist in this effort, the District uses a facility survey instrument developed by the State of California Office of Public School Construction. The results of this survey are available at the Maintenance Office.

#### Maintenance and Repairs:

District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. The District annually inspects wheelchair lifts, tests fire extinguishers, inspects and services all playground backboards, replaces bark on playgrounds and landscaping, and services HVAC units.

#### School Facility Repair Status:

Overall Summary School Facility Repair Status: Exemplary

The inspection included a check of possible gas leaks, mechanical systems, interior and exterior doors and windows, interior surface areas, structural damage, electrical, playground equipment, and hazardous materials. In all areas this school passed inspection.

## Cleaning Process and Schedule:

The District has adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the District. The principal works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

#### Deferred Maintenance Budget:

The District participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides state matching funds on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to assist school districts with expenditures for major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Typically, this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems. Since 2008- 2009 the State has suspended the program due to State Budget Reductions. The District still maintains its own program.

#### School Safety Plan (School Year 2017-18)

Safety of students and staff is a primary concern of Barbara Chilton Middle. The school is in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. The School Site Safety plan was last reviewed and updated on November 30, 2017, by the School Safety Committee. All revisions were communicated to both the classified and certificated staff. The school's disaster preparedness plan includes steps for ensuring student and staff safety during a disaster. Fire and disaster drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year. Lockdown drills are held once per trimester. Students are supervised before and after school by certificated staff/classified staff/principal, and classified staff / principal supervise students during lunch. There is a designated area for student drop off and pick up. All parents and visitors must sign in at the front office and wear a badge.
